





## Supporting your child with reading

## Early Reading at St. Joseph's

Our Reception children have all had a fabulous start to school and have settled in well. The children are taking home reading books linked to the phonics they are learning in class, and a class library book to share with an adult. Check out these top tips on supporting your children as they embark on their reading journey...

Take you child to your

local library and

Read to your child on a regular basis. Try to make it a special time in a quiet setting.

Help your child read numbers, letters and signs in the environment.

Stories on ipads/ tablets etc. are wonderful but please don't let this take the place of sharing a book with your child. Remember "There is no app to replace your lap!"

Look at 100 books to read before you turn 5 for great inspiration for quality texts to read with your child.



## Supporting your child with reading

#### Reading for Understanding

As well as becoming fluent confident readers, your children will be assessed on their understanding of what they are reading. From Year 1 onwards, your children will become familiar with the reading VIPERS in class; these are the key reading skills we teach for children to be able to read and comprehend a wide range of literary texts. It is important to ask questions when reading with your children in order to check their understanding. 

# Book Recommendations




Mrs Partridge recommends... 'I am the Seed that Grew the Tree' by Fiona Waters. This would make a fantastic Christmas present for children and adults alike.

A beautiful collection of poems old and new, with a poem for every day of the year. A firm favourite with 2P (2018 onwards). My current class love hearing me read from this, and often choose it to read during our 'Reading for Pleasure' session. I'd recommend this to Year 2 right through to Year 6 and beyond.



Joseph in 2P recommends... 'The BFG' by Roald Dahl. "It is about a giant and a girl who go on an adventure together. My mum read it to me and I felt like I was on the adventure too.

I think children in Year 1 and Year 2 would like this as a bedtime story."



Daniel in 6S recommends...'The Parent Agency' by David Baddiel. "I recommend this book because it is funny and will get you engaged into reading. There is a wide range of vocabulary. The story is about a boy who is in a world where he can choose his parents. Think this book is suitable for children from Y3 to Y6."
