Monday 8th May-Thursday 11th May 2023

The Key Stage 2 Tests

- ▶ SATs take place nationally in the week commencing 8th May 2023.
- ▶ Statutory tests will be administered in the following subjects:
 - ▶ Spelling (approximately 15 minutes)
 - ▶ Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar (45 minutes)
 - ▶ Reading (60 minutes)
 - ▶ Mathematics
 - ▶ - Paper 1: Arithmetic (30 minutes)
 - ▶ - Paper 2: Reasoning (40 minutes)
 - ▶ - Paper 3: Reasoning (40 minutes)
- All tests are externally marked.
- Writing will be 'Teacher Assessed' internally.

Assessment and Reporting

- Test scores will be reported as ‘scaled scores’.
- Scaled scores range from 80-120.
- The “national average” is deemed to be a scaled score of 100.
- 110 is seen to be “greater depth”.

Results

- ▶ In July 2023, each pupil will receive:
 - ▶ A raw score (number of raw marks awarded).
 - ▶ A scaled score in each tested subject.
 - ▶ Confirmation of whether or not they attained the national standard.

Higher-Attaining Children

- There is not a separate test for the most able children.
- Instead, each test will have scope for higher attaining pupils to show their strengths.

The SATs Timetable ...

Monday 8th May

Key stage 2 English grammar, punctuation and spelling tests:

- Paper 1, short answer questions
- Paper 2, spelling
 - A Spelling test is administered containing 20 words, lasting approximately 15 minutes.
 - A separate test is given on Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar
 - This test lasts for 45 minutes and requires short answer questions, including some multiple choice.
 - Marks for these two tests are added together to give a total for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar.

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (Paper 2)

Tuesday 9th May

Key stage 2 English reading test, reading booklet and associated answer booklet.

The Reading Test consists of a single test paper with three unrelated reading texts.

- Children are given 60 minutes in total, which includes reading the texts and answering the questions.
- A total of 50 marks is available.
- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- Some questions are multiple choice or selected response, others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation.

Reading

Example question, based on Text 1 – *Space Tourism*:

How would you get to your space hotel?

In the future there may be hotels in space for all the tourists. It wouldn't take long for the space shuttle to get out of the Earth's atmosphere. Then, without Earth's gravity, you would become weightless. Arrival at the hotel would be like an aeroplane parking at an airport, but you would leave the cabin floating along the access tube, holding on to a cable.

Wednesday 10th May

Key stage 2 mathematics:

- Paper 1 arithmetic test
- Paper 2 reasoning test

- Children will sit three maths tests over 2 days: Paper 1, Paper 2 and Paper 3.
- Paper 1 is for 'Arithmetic' lasting for 30 minutes, covering calculation methods for all operations, including use of fractions, percentages and decimals.
- Questions gradually increase in difficulty.
- Paper 2 covers 'Problem Solving and Reasoning' and lasts for 40 minutes.
- Pupils will still require calculation skills but will need to answer questions in context and decide what is required to find a solution.

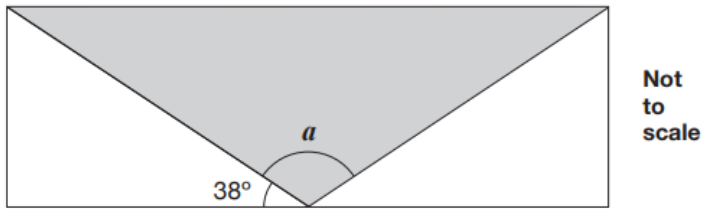

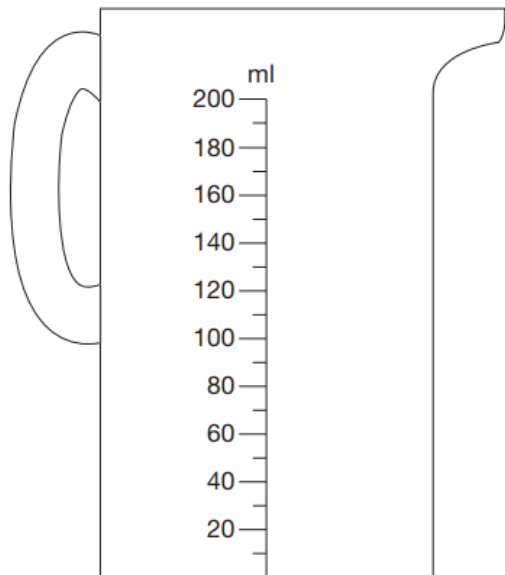
KS2 mathematics, Paper 3, reasoning

Writing

- Writing will be assessed by the Year 6 teachers.
- There is not a written test for writing.
- There are three grades that can be awarded: Working Towards (expected level), Working At (expected level) and Working in Greater Depth.

Remember this about SATs ...

SATs focus on what they know about Maths and English

They won't reflect how talented they are at Science, Geography, Art or PE, and they certainly won't highlight positive personal characteristics such as kindness and integrity.

SATs results don't always tell the whole story

The results will say they DID or DIDN'T meet a certain standard, but not necessarily by what margin. Additionally, the thresholds tend to change each year according to overall national performance, so what was classed as 'did meet the expected standard' in 2021 may have been considered a 'did not' in 2019. Your school may be able to provide you with more detailed feedback, so don't let your child see SATs as a simple case of 'pass' or 'fail'.

SATs last for one week

In reality, it's just one or two papers lasting 30-60 minutes each day. We can't emphasise enough the importance of keeping that in perspective.
